Intent in Sharing	Collaboration and true celebration.	Exploitation and personal gain.
Reaction to the Baby Pots	Calculated test of honesty.	Blind greed.
The Ultimate Result	Retains his silver, teaches a lesson, earns the Raja's amusement.	Lose their valuable silver pots and are exposed as fools.
Conclusion: True collaboration means sharing without expecting a reward. Greed makes people blind to logic.

The Rules of Scale: Degrees of Adjectives

Superlative Degree

Used to compare more than two things.
We usually add the suffix **-est**.

BIGGEST

Comparative Degree

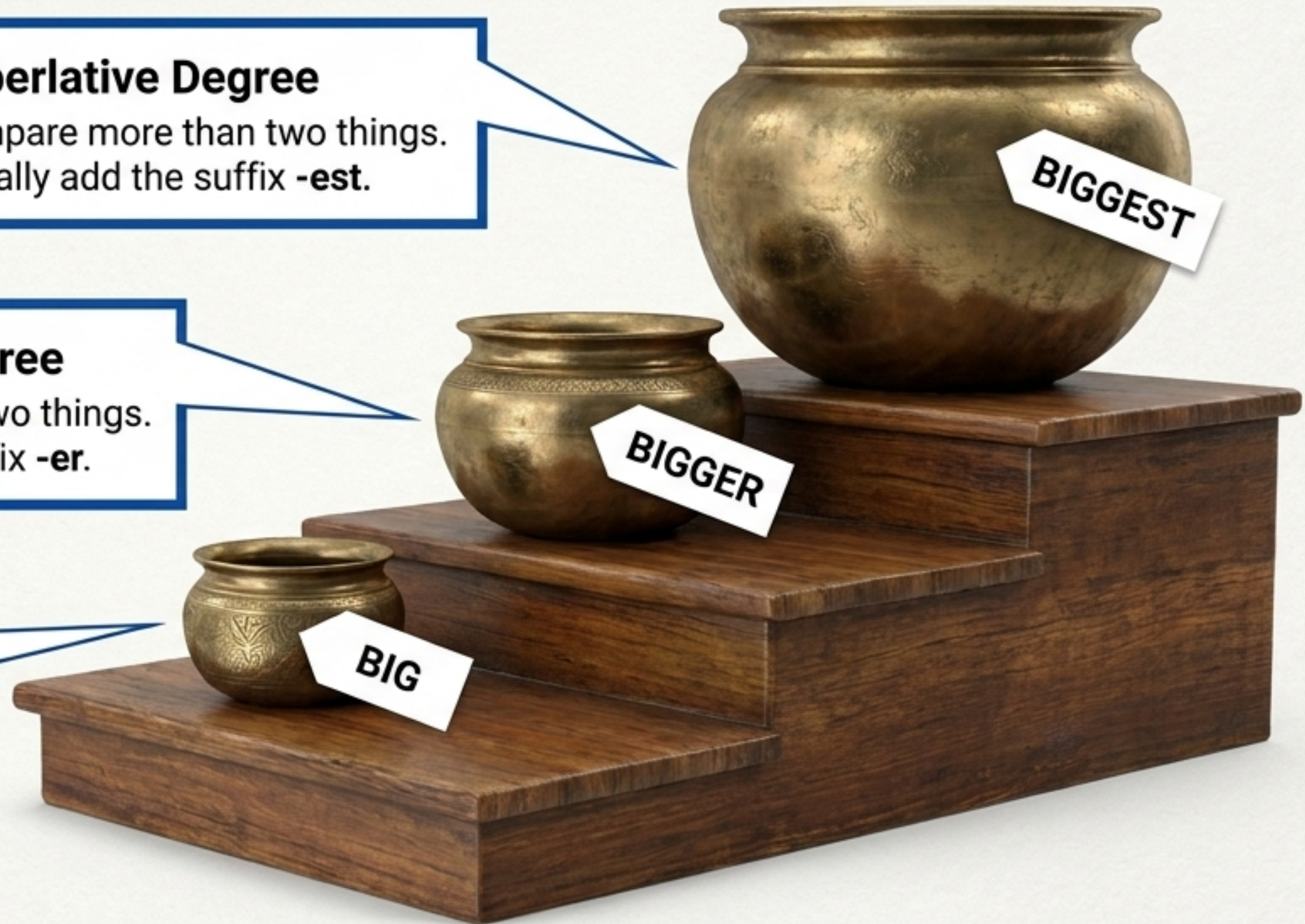
Used to compare exactly two things.
We usually add the suffix **-er**.

BIGGER

Base Adjective

Used to describe a
single noun.

BIG

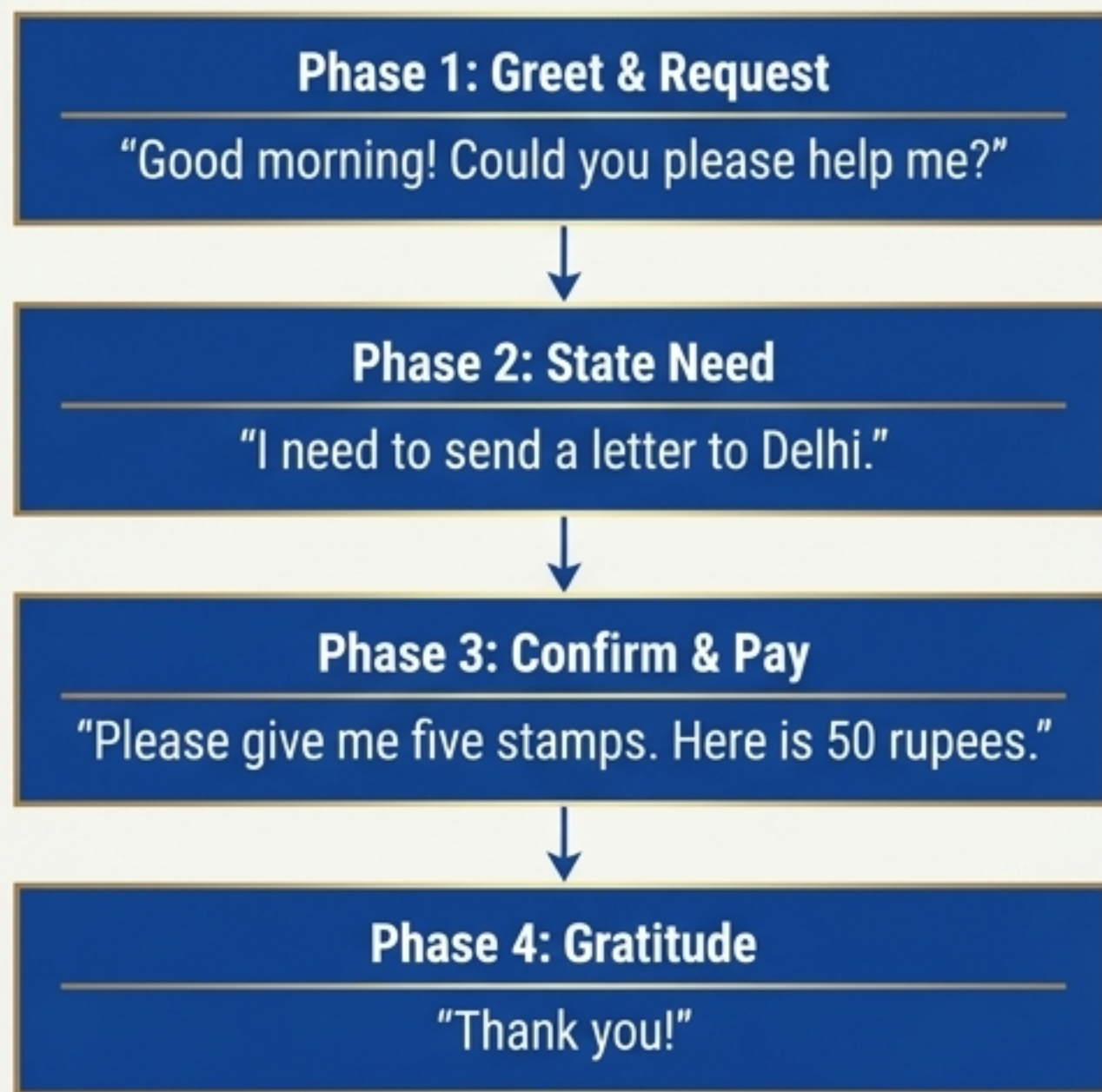


The Adjective Transformation Matrix

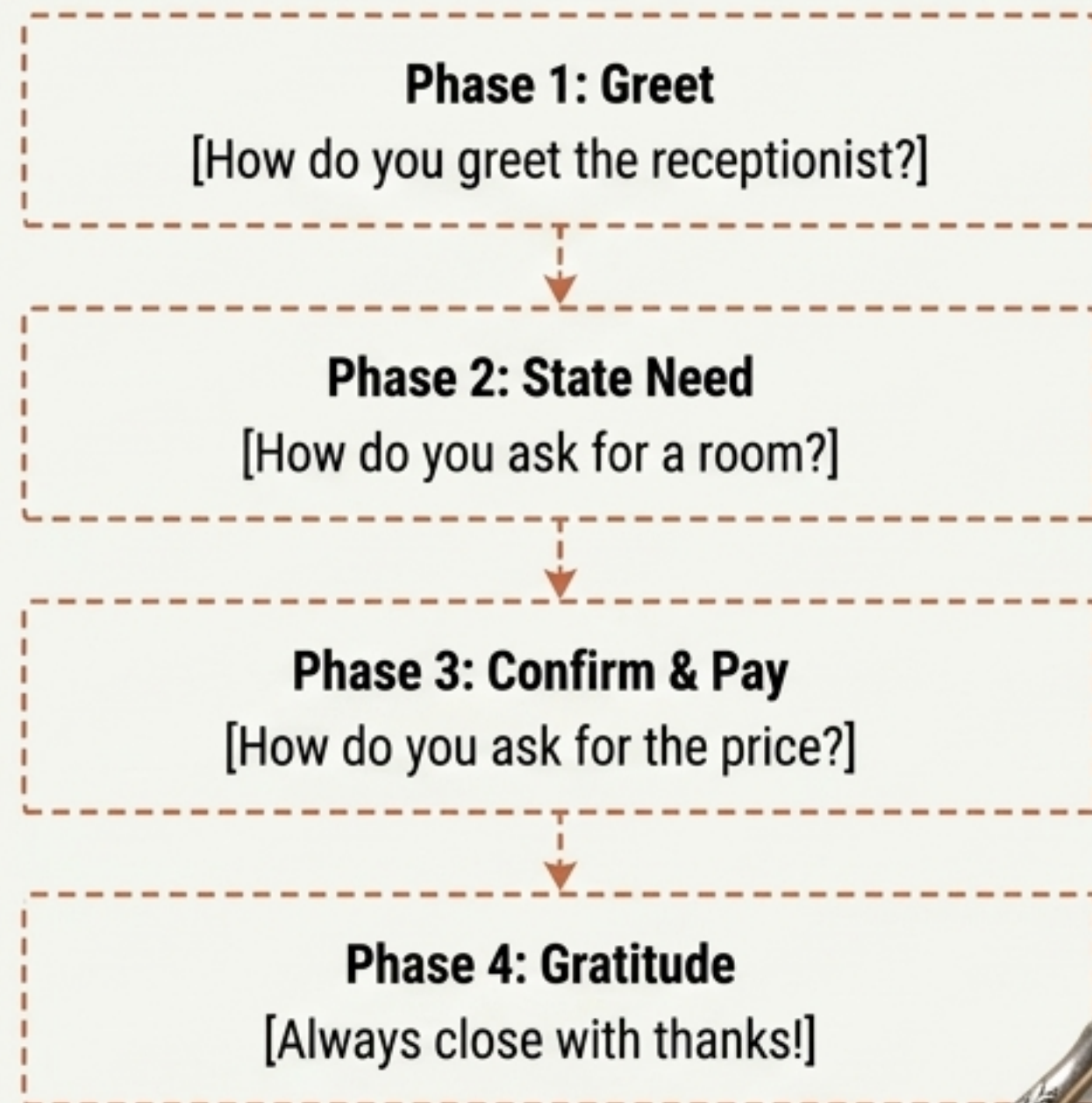
Rule Description	Base Word	Comparative	Superlative
Silent 'e': Add -r / -st	nice	nicer	nicest
1 Vowel + 1 Consonant: Double consonant + -er / -est	fat	fatter	fattest
2 Vowels + 1 Consonant: Do not double, just add -er / -est	deep	deeper	deepest
Ends in 'y': Replace 'y' with 'i', add -er / -est	naughty	naughtier	naughtiest
Irregular: Major spelling changes or use more/most	wonderful	more wonderful	most wonderful
Irregular: Complete transformation	bad	worse	worst
